Erith Yacht Club Gets New Clubhouse



The amazing transformation of Erith Yacht Club, now that the building of our new Clubhouse has been completed, has been truly fantastic. More people are visiting the Club and consequently applications for membership have also increased. Without our new building we would never have been able to cope as regards numbers and the variety of individuals in the general public.

These latter people tend to view yachting as an elitist sport, this is far from the truth. E.Y.C. members come from all walks of life. You only buy a boat that is within your means, including running costs, as you would a car or caravan. Erith Yacht Club offers courses in both sailing and power boating. All our instructors are fully trained having been on relevant courses run by the Royal Yachting Association, and we also employ a full time professional coach.

Tuition is given afloat and ashore, the latter in the Clubhouse class rooms.

Yacht and dinghy sailing events are well catered for by a variety of races and cruises for those who wish to participate. Our Social Committee runs, to a certain extent, in conjunction with the sailing events, but organizes social evenings for the members and their guests.

What Do You Know About the Erith Rowing Club?

Being a riverside town, Erith has always had a close affinity with rowing, from the wherries who used to unload ships in the Middle Ages, through to Erith Rowing Club's racing activities of the present day. Many older residents of the town can remember the Erith Town Regatta, which started in the 1890s and was held each August Bank Holiday until the 1950s. Local social clubs, pubs and firms from the area would race each other regularly at weekends.

Over the years several rowing clubs were founded but by 1940 only one or two remained and in 1943 Erith Rowing Club was founded. It is the only rowing club on the Thames between Greenwich and Gravesend and has always been open to people from all walks of life and all levels of society. The Club has taught and trained many people from very diverse backgrounds and occupations to row and race with considerable success. For many years the Club organised an annual August Bank Holiday Regatta, initially on the Thames at Erith as part of the Town's August Bank Holiday celebrations, and latterly on Danson Lake (the

'Danson Dashes'), which we hope to reinstate, where clubs from all over the country have competed.

The Club has had several homes over the years and currently we are in the Old Police Station on Erith High Street. Our smart, modern Clubhouse is where winter land training takes place on several evenings a week as well as numerous social events throughout the year.

We have been regularly competing successfully in rowing (where participants use one oar each) and sculling (two oars each) events since 1943. The Club has always competed across the country in different regattas and head races and is a regular supporter of events in the surrounding area – particularly on the Medway at Maidstone where it has had many successes. However, it also takes part in events as far afield as Chester and the upper Thames, and has entered crews at Henley Royal Regatta.

There is an excellent fleet of boats catering for people from 11 upwards of both sexes, all shapes, sizes and ages and all levels of expertise from beginners to the very highest

(a former member previously won at Henley Royal Regatta and represented Australia in the Olympics in 1976). The Club has qualified coaches and uses Danson Lake in Danson Park, just off the A2 at Bexleyheath, on Tuesday evenings in the summer and Saturday mornings all year round to teach people to row before they can take to the Thames at Erith, where you may see us out on the water on Thursday evenings (summer only) and Sunday mornings, weather permitting.

Our "Learn to row" courses are popular and have been fully booked from May to August, but there are still places available on Courses 5 and 6 (September and October). Looking forward to a Selkirk Summer 2011

Most people know of Daniel Defoe's novel Robinson Crusoe, but not as many know that this 'first novel in English' was based on the adventures of a man named Alexander Selkirk. This Scottish sailor disembarked at Erith on 14th October 1711, following his 4 year isolation.



But why Erith? A small working group, led by Maggie O'Neill, a longstanding local resident and councillor and me, Robyn Drummond, has formed hoping to use the 300th anniversary of this event as a vehicle to raise consciousness of the unique contribution of Erith and the Thames to local, national and international history.

We are planning to hold a commemorative event on Saturday 15th October 2011. The focus for that day is likely to be a staged landing with opportunities to celebrate 18th century culture, fashion, sea and river history, mythology, songs and literature, etc, although it is also the group's intention to link this with a series of community and school based events and projects

throughout 2011, mostly through a nautically themed Selkirk Summer, based close to the river in Erith, Slade Green, and Belvedere.

These events will hopefully include participation in the Erith Riverside and Danson Festivals, both in June, and local and national history societies, forums, libraries, theatres and operatic societies, museums, rowing clubs, scouts, and literary groups will be invited to participate or support these events.

Other possibilities include a creative partnership between artists and local schools, street parties for roads with related names such as Friday and Crusoe Roads, children's activity days, and having costumed actors in conjunction with written or guided tours for all ages.
