Bexley Accessible Transport Scheme (BATS) Hop 'n' Shop Shopping Bus service in Bexley

Since the inception of this exciting service in 2007, BATS has recruited 127 happy shoppers who use the bus on a regular basis to access opportunities to buy their food supplies.

With an itinerary of places to visit each month ranging from local supermarkets to Swanley Market, fresh fruit and vegetable shops and garden centres, members are never short of places to shop and socialise.

Shoppers are invited to free workshops run by BATS in partnership with the Bexley Care Trust on healthy eating, where new recipes and ideas are demonstrated to help you eat more healthily.

Volunteer passenger assistants are available to help you embark and disembark the bus and assist you with your shopping if required. There is plenty of space on board the bus for bags and shopping trolleys and the bus is fully accessible by passenger lift for wheelchair users or those with limited mobility.

Membership is open to the Elderly, Disabled and Parents with young children under 5 who have difficulty accessing public transport and shopping opportunities for food.

For £15 per annum and 50p each way (prepaid ticket) door to door, the Hop 'n' Shop represents exceptional value for money and a great chance to meet new friends using this service.

We hope to get the Forum included on the interactive information station recently placed in Riverside.

We are also currently in contact with Orbit Housing Association and Crest Nicholson, the two organisations who will be taking forward the Erith Western Gateway Development. Both have stated that they will fully involve the Forum in consultation processes for this important project.

Europa Gym - Giving Young People a Chance

The Erith based Europa Centre has developed over the past 16 years with a tremendous amount of local community help, to become a unique sporting experience for young people. Regenerating a disused old light industrial building into an imaginatively designed sports training venue, offering permanently set up areas for Gymnastics, Boxing, Weightlifting and 2 Rehearsal Studios plus a multi use hall for Karate, Aikido and Street Dance.

The Europa Gymnastic Club runs pre-school structured classes, recreational sessions and competitive squads and is fully equipped for both boys and girls gymnastics along with foam filled pits and many other training aids to encourage the fun in learning the sport of Gymnastics. The Club is also very proud to offer classes to youngsters and adults with Special Needs.

Originally starting up as a Gymnastic Centre, the unusual layout of the Fraser Road site lent itself to other sporting activities. The non-profit making Europa Gymnastic Club offered other sporting groups the opportunity to establish themselves, by not charging them rent initially. This philosophy has now seen the membership of the centre grow to nearly 1400 per week.

It was at a 'Preliminary Meeting' in January 1929 that it was agreed that a Rotary Club should be formed within the 'Urban District of Erith' and so with much help from the Rotary Club of Gravesend, the Club was duly formed.

Rotary International had been founded in 1905 in Chicago by a local Attorney and three other colleagues to provide a regular meeting to enjoy each other's fellowship and moved across the Atlantic in 1911. The rest is history and Rotary International is one of the largest 'Service Clubs' in the world with over 1.2 Million Members in 30,000 Clubs in

nearly 200 Countries based on the principle of 'Service above Self'.

In February we are hosting the visit of the President of Rotary International Great Britain and Ireland [RIBI] when all the ten clubs in the North West of our District, Kent and East Sussex will be present. So you can see that we are just a small part of a large organisation. However, what matters to us is Erith, and how we can serve the Community.

If you are over the age of eighteen and can attend a weekly luncheon meeting or help in any way then we are always interested to hear from you. The action of giving service is by far one of the greatest parts of Rotary.
