

Larner Road Re-Development



The seven tower blocks of the Larner Road estate are distinctive landmarks on the approach to Erith along Northend Road. In spite of efforts by estate staff to keep the neighbourhood presentable, it no longer meets residents' expectations and is increasingly unpopular. After consultation with local people the housing association, Orbit South, has decided to demolish all the current buildings and replace them with new family homes and low rise apartments.

The new development will have a wider range of homes from one bedroom flats to four bedroom family houses with gardens. There will also be a mix of housing types including affordable rented homes, low-cost home ownership and homes for sale.

There is still a lot of work to do before demolition starts. We expect the design process to begin in early 2012 and there will be extensive local consultation to ensure that we take into account everyone's views and priorities. We hope to have planning permission by summer 2013 with a start on site later that year. In the meantime, the 620 residents of the estate are beginning to find other homes, across Bexley and elsewhere. The empty flats are then available for local people on short term lets until the demolition begins.

Selkirk summer starts with a BANG!

The Selkirk Summer is celebrating the 300th anniversary of the arrival in Erith of Alexander Selkirk – the real life inspiration for Robinson Crusoe. We kicked off with the Selkirk Spectacular Family Fun Day on 26th June, and every one had a fabulous time!

But we've got even more planned! Talks about Erith's seafaring history, activities and fun days for children, drama, history and art trails to follow around the town, and even a music concert!

We are also working with Belvedere, Peareswood, St Augustines and Slade Green primary schools, and the Erith Academy, to produce work exploring Selkirk, Crusoe and Erith over the past 500 years.

All the primary schools will contribute towards a huge

frieze depicting the Strange and Surprising Adventures of Robinson Crusoe, which will be displayed alongside other work produced, at the Halcot Gallery at Hall Place, Bexley from 15th September.

To crown the Selkirk Summer, on the 15th October 2011, the anniversary of Selkirk's arrival, will be a day of activities around Erith riverfront and the town centre, including a re-enactment using costumed actors of Selkirk's disembarking at the jetty in Erith.

The Rotary Club of Erith Development Committee 1934 and 'The Riversite'

The acquisition of a site on the bank of the Thames within the Borough, and its development for the enjoyment of the river by the citizens, had long been in the minds of successive Erith Councils, all of whom had failed to come to a definite decision.

For some years Cannon & Gaze's Mills in the High Street, with a long frontage to the river, had stood empty when the Club [The Rotary Club of Erith] brought into being the 'Erith Improvement Committee.' Although he did not serve on this Committee, it was Rotarian Stanley Bullock who first suggested to them the purchase of the Mills for use as a Riversite. Adopting the line of approach customary in matters of delicacy, the Committee, mainly through the influence of Cope their Chairman, succeeded, by slow degrees, in engaging the interest in these premises of certain prominent members of the Erith Urban District Council. Matters proceeded very slowly while "discussions in Town" were going on until, towards the end of 1935, it became so well known that the matter was being discussed that

the Club considered the question and finally decided to invite to a debate at one of the Club's lunches representatives of the two points of view – for and against acquisition.

The Rotary Club of Erith continued to foster the project, listening to talks at later meetings by the well-known local Waterman, Jim Coles, who spoke in support from the point of view of his lifelong associations with Erith and his knowledge of the river, and the Rev. Moses Williams, also a keen advocate of the scheme.

In due course, when the Ministry of Health Inspector held a Public Enquiry into the Council's proposal to acquire the site, all concerned supported the Council.

Eventually the Club had the satisfaction of seeing the scheme come to fruition, the Council naming the development "The Riversite".

Riverside Festival 2011

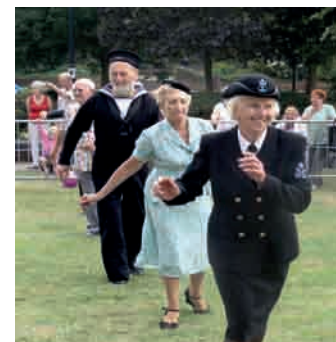
Due to unforeseen circumstances and unrealistic financial demands from Bexley Council, we regret that this year's Erith Riverside Festival had to be cancelled.

Friends Of Riverside Gardens Erith

On behalf of its 600 plus members, FORGE submitted a strong Representation to Bexley Council in response to the draft plans for the centre of Erith Town. Copies were also sent to our three ward councillors and three senior conservative councillors, together with the three MPs for Bexley, the Mayor of London, and the London Assembly Member for Bexley & Bromley.

Organisations supporting FORGE include Bexley Civic Society; Erith & Belvedere Local History Society; Erith Town Forum; Erith Rotary Club; Friends of the Earth Bexley; and the Open Spaces Society. The Bishop of Tonbridge is a member of FORGE. Members of Erith Rowing Club, Erith Yacht Club, Erith Theatre Guild and, Erith Women's Institute have also joined forces with us.

Our Town Green application is progressing well Using the Freedom of Information Act

we have procured documentation and information from Bexley Council. Keen and supportive local FORGE residents are completing detailed Evidence Questionnaires and producing Witness Statements.

In addition FORGE has taken a further step by setting up a PETITION for the community to confirm its strong and resolute desire to retain the complete Riverside Gardens and promenade without any multi-storey building constructed on any part of it. Our MP Teresa Pearce will present it to the House of Commons urging greater protection for green areas of particular importance for local communities in the Localism Bill. Please sign the Petition if you haven't already done so by the 27th June 2011.

FORGE has received legal advice through the London Planning Aid organisation.

On 1st June the FORGE Chairman and Secretary met with the London

Assembly Member for Bexley & Bromley, Mr. James Cleverley, to discuss our grave concerns. It seems that, despite copious photographic evidence to the contrary, claims continue to be made that "the Gardens are underused".

The first "clean-up" of the Erith foreshore set up by FORGE with Thames 21 took place on the 27th March when about 2 tons of rubbish was removed from the mud. Good community support! A second "clean-up" is now arranged for Saturday the 9th July, 11am

to 3 pm. Please come along and give support moral and/or physical. Please meet at the jetty on the Riverside Gardens.

Finally, be ready for sudden announcements during holiday times if a developer for the Flagpole Site is unexpectedly made public and a firm planning proposal is made for the Gardens. All of us will need to resolutely respond. Everyone's support is essential
